## Legal Tech Rundown: LegalZoom Announces Gen AI Assistant, Jackson Lewis Launches Assessment Tool, and More

An update on the legal tech market's past few weeks, from product launches to new partnerships.

The fast-paced legal tech world is constantly evolving. At Legaltech News, we always try to bring you the latest news on hirings, product and feature releases, new integrations, legal tech mergers and acquisitions, and more. The Legal Tech Rundown is a periodic update of legal tech stories that might have gone under the radar over the past few weeks.

**Bundledocs:** On Oct. 5, the cloud-based document binding provider announced a strategic partnership with 3545 Consulting Global, an IT consultancy focused on legal tech solutions. As a part of the alliance, the consulting group will advise legal professionals they serve, like law firms and in-house IT teams on leveraging cloud-based binding solutions as a digital pre-trial strategy, according to the press release. “We have been extremely impressed with how Bundledocs has revolutionized cloud-based document binding and bundling in the U.K. and Europe in particular, and what they are now bringing to the North American market,” stated Nancy Griffing, president of 3545 Consulting, in the press release.

**Clarra:** On Oct. 3, the cloud-based case management provider announced the launch of its flagship product, an SaaS application meant to optimize docket-driven litigation, according to the press release. Clarra currently has 20 clients and is expected to make a public launch in the coming weeks, as per the release. The release added that the case management platform was “developed in-house at a large plaintiffs’ firm pursuing aggressive growth” and is designed specifically for litigation workflows.

**Crediverso:** On Sep. 26, the Spanish and English-language consumer technology company announced its expansion into the legal market after raising \$3.5 million in a pre-series A funding round. The latest round brings the provider’s total funding to \$6.6 million. Additionally, Crediverso will leverage generative artificial intelligence, and use the funds to

launch “My Pocket Lawyer,” a platform meant to address the market gap between low-quality legal guidance and expensive lawyers, according to the press release. The platform will enable consumers to “educate themselves about basic legal facts.”

**FTI:** On Sept. 27, FTI Consulting announced updates to its Connect and Universal Messaging Platform solutions. The developments were a result of the growing need for faster processing of language characters, along with access to data from platforms like WeChat, WhatsApp and Viber, according to the press release. Some of these updates include new pre-built connectors to manage data integrations with widely used collaboration apps, workarounds for hurdles forensic tools face in the Asia Pacific Region, density analysis for short-form messages from certain apps and increased flexibility to address compatibility issues with various forensics tools.

**Jackson Lewis:** On Oct. 2, employment law firm Jackson Lewis announced the launch of a new website compliance assessment tool, which came as a result of the firm’s collaboration with AI-powered risk management firm SecondSight. The tool is meant to provide clients insight into which tracking tools are embedded into their website, what value those tools bring, and the ways the data privacy risks from those tools can be mitigated, according to the press release. “Website tracking technologies have garnered frequent attention from the firm and our clients,” said Jason C. Gavejian, co-leader of the firm’s privacy, data and cybersecurity group, in the release. “In the last 18 months alone, we’ve seen cases targeting the healthcare, retail, insurance, real estate, tax preparation, aviation and automotive industries. When used without proper care and consideration, these trackers expose organizations to substantial litigation and regulatory risk.”

**Lawlines:** On Oct. 3, attorney education platform Lawlines announced the launch of a new “Learning Assistant,” powered by artificial intelligence technology, according to the press release. The tool is able to tap into a reservoir of over 1,900 CLE course transcripts. Using this data, the assistant can answer specific legal questions and guide the user to finding the specific CLE course that may be pertinent to their question, according to the release. The “Learning Assistant” is now live in the Lawlines Course Center.

**LegalZoom:** On Sept. 28, the online legal services provider announced the beta launch of “Doc Assist,” a free document summarization tool. The solution utilizes generative AI to synthesize uploaded legal documents into summaries that can highlight key details, crucial clauses and prompts questions based on the information. The solution seeks to cater to small businesses, who might otherwise be intimidated by the cost of hiring attorneys, according to the press release. “Every small business should be able to understand the contracts it signs or sends for signature. Generative AI is an important component, but it’s best coupled with a credentialed attorney who is well versed in the type of legal document in question. LegalZoom is in a unique position to provide access to both,” said Dan Wernikoff, LegalZoom’s CEO, in the release.

**Opus 2:** On Sept. 4, the International Dispute Resolution Centre (IDRC) in London launched the IDRC Opus 2 Suite, which is a new “hearing room” meant to provide a tech-enabled space for arbitrations, according to the press release. Oliver McClintock, chief commercial officer at Opus 2, said in the release, “We are pleased to strengthen our long-standing partnership with the IDRC to drive innovation and bring more value to the international dispute resolution community. Today’s lawyers rightly demand greater consistency and robust technology throughout the lifecycle of their cases, so they can continue to focus on the substantive issues of their case and deliver the best possible outcomes to their clients.”

**Paladin:** On Oct. 3, access to justice platform Paladin and law firm Benesch announced a strategic partnership, whereby the firm would access Paladin’s network to expand its pro bono program. The collaboration enables Benesch attorneys to meet their goals and have access to professional development opportunities in the community, while firm leadership tracks employee activity. The law firm is focused on 14 specific skills its attorneys stand to gain from the pro bono opportunity, including “negotiation,” “client communication” and “courtroom experience,” among others, according to the press release.

**Wolters Kluwer:** On Oct. 5, Wolters Kluwer CT Corp. unveiled a new regulatory online quiz geared toward law firms, CPA firms and corporations who might need help determining their Beneficial Ownership Information filings status under the forthcoming Corporate Transparency Act (CTA), according to the press release. The quiz consists of yes/no questions, and guides users through the CTA's 23 exemptions, to determine if they required to file a Beneficial Ownership Information Report with the U.S. Treasury's Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN), as per the release.

**Wordrake:** On Oct. 3, WordRake Holdings LLC released version 4.2 of its editing software Woodrake, its second update in 2023. The new version consists of new edits to assist in writing, and gender-neutral pronouns, among other features, according to the press release. Additionally, the new version includes allows users to convert colloquial phrases into more literal meanings, change indirect passive constructions into active voice, remove repetitive adjectives and verbs and trim nominalizations and convert them into active verbs, are meant to assist in legal writing.
